




Amazon Hosts Behind-the-Scenes Tour and Ribbon Cutting for Amazon's Last Mile Facility in Fallon Nevada

The 24,000 square-foot facility has created over 50 full and part time employees and 50 flex drivers with competitive pay and benefits starting on day one.

Fallon, Nevada. – February 13, 2025- Amazon celebrated the official opening of a new, state-of-theart delivery station with Mayor Ken Tedford, state and local officials and community partners in Fallon.

Mayor Tedford thanked Amazon for working with the city's public works, business and legal departments to make the facility a reality. "This new delivery station enhances our infrastructure, strengthens our local economy, and ensures residents and businesses benefit from faster, more reliable service," said Fallon Mayor Ken Tedford.

Tareq Wafaie, Amazon's economic development manager thanked the Fallon Paiute Shoshone Tribe, Vo-

cational Rehab Manager Vanessa Charley for assistance in helping their members attain employment with Amazon.

Located on New River Parkway, WNV3 is part of Amazon's "last mile" – the last stop before Amazon packages are delivered to customers in a 60 mile radius.

Employees at the site sort, scan and prepare packages before they are loaded onto vehicles operated by contracted flex delivery partners. Delivery stations are part of Amazon's logistics chain and are located close to customers.

As of January 2024, Amazon has created more than 20,000 full and part time jobs in Nevada.

We are excited that Amazon's chose Fallon to expand in and we are honored to have such a strong growth partnership with Amazon and are thrilled that their newest Delivery site is Fallon.

Children Story Time: On Thursday, Barbara Culbertson (Dimbi Hibajo), Millie Brigham (Shoshone Speaker), and THPO, Rebecca Young-Man gave a story to the Children at the CLC, the children had fun. Rebecca told the story in English and Millie told the story in Shoshone, and Barbara was the Dimbi Hibajo. All over the world and all over Indian Country have a story like this; some call her the basket woman. Here is the story told too me, as a child. Barbara and Millie helped me because they heard the story too.

Dimbi Hibajo: If you do bad during the day, the Dimbi Hibajo will come at night. The reason why she come at night and take you, and Dimbi Hibajo put you in her basket, and she turned you into a rock kid, it is because you did bad during the day. Because you lied, because you stole, because you talked bad, because you killed for no reason. (Like shooting a bird with your BB gun) because your fighting with others, because you were not loving to your people, because you were doing bad things during the day. When Dimbi Hibijo take you at night, you turn to rock, so be good during the day so you will not have bad dreams or go to bed in a bad way.

Activity: Have the child put their finger to their nose and say: No lie, no steal, no talking bad, no kill for no reason, no fighting with others, Love your people.

Have courage, be brave, be truthful, honest, learn wisdom, respect others, and learn humility. These are the teaching of our ancestors. If we follow these teaching, we will be ok. These teaching are not easy to follow, but we should try. The more and more we practice the easier it gets. (The story is in Indian English), so the story can be told as is, an Indian Story, most of our

stories were about life, and how to deal with life. Our stories talk about animals, and give us a lesson. Please bring in a story that your family might have into my office so we can bring it back to life.

Cultural Activities:

Moving together Pow-Wow, (May 30, 31 & June 1) on Friday they are having a cultural night pageant. Please keep an eye on the flyers.

Seed project: I spoke with USFW services, BLM; lands are barren because of the wild fires. The BLM does not have a cache of seeds. This is a business opportunity for anyone who wants to make extra money. They say that in a few years this could be a moneymaker. The BLM and USFW will give you the seed to grow. I am going to have a meeting with anyone interested with the governmental agencies to grow our traditional seeds. Please watch for the meeting date.

Cultural News: Every 1st, 2nd, and 3rd Wednesday night between 6:30 pm and 8:30pm, we have a; Pow-Wow club meeting, some of the activities going on are, the history of the drum, songs and children/parents are beading and working on their regalia. There are artist spending allot of time trying to give our crafts, song and dance to the next generation.


AMONG AMERICAN INDIANS & ALASKA NATIVES IN UTAH & NEVADA (2018-2022)



YOU CAN PREVENT AN OPIOID OVERDOSE DEATH WITH NALOXONE (NARCAN)

-a prescription opioid antagonist that can temporarily reverse the effects of an opioid overdose and prevent death (More than one dose may be necessary to maintain opioid reversal.

In 2022, 224 People died each day from an Opioid

Overdose in the U.S.

- -"Knocks" the opioid off the opiate receptor in the brain
- -Not harmful if no opioids in bloodstream
- -Effective usually in 1 to 3 minutes
- -Effects last between 30 to 90 minutes

OPIOID OVERDOSE KIT

NARCAN (NALOXONE) NASAL SPRAY

- Remove naloxone from the box
- Peel back the tab with the circle at the top right corner to open
- Hold the naloxone with your thumb on the bottom of the plunger and your first and middle fingers on either side of the nozzle
- Tilt the person's head back and provide support under the neck with your hand
- Gently insert the top of the nozzle into one nostril, until your fingers on either side of the nozzle are against the bottom of the person's nose.
- Press the plunger firmly to give the dose of the naloxone
- A dose can be given every 2 to 3 minutes until independent breathing begins
- Repeat naloxone administration in the opposite nostril if necessary
- If no response, continue to repeat naloxone administration if available until an ambulance has arrived

NALOXONE SIDE EFFECTS


Includes agitation, nausea, excessive sweating, running/bloody nose, fast heartbeat & high blood pressure

ENSURING HIGHER LEVEL OF CARE

After naloxone administration, the patient should continue to be observed until an ambulance. arrives or transport to a medical facility occurs.



High Winds Knock Down Power Pole



A power pole toppled over in a windstorm in front of the tribal administration building. Tribal police received a report of a downed utility pole due to high winds as they directed traffic.

Winds of 20 to 30 mph, with gusts exceeding 50 miles an hour blew over a power pole on Rio Vista Drive in front of the Tribal Administration Building.

The incident happened around 3 p.m. The Fallon Tribal Police were on scene to direct traffic and there were no injuries associated with it, but there was power outages.

Chairwoman Williams-Tuni stated, "Because of the hanging power pole and power outage, the Administration Building will be closed and services will be back in operation at 8am the following day. Please be careful and use caution because of the high winds."

Emergency Management Coordinator Jackie Conway had informed the community beforehand about the strong winds that were expected that day as she sent out a weather briefing from the National Weather Service, which is a key component of successful emergency preparedness and response.

The windiest month of the year in Fallon is April, with an average hourly wind speed of 7.3 miles per hour.





The Fallon Paiute Shoshone Tribe would like to thank Chief Blackeye for his dedicated service to our community. Your leadership sets you as a noteworthy leader in Indian Country.

The FBC gifted Chief Blackeye to lunch and a beautiful Pendleton blanket. Chairwoman Williams-Tuni stated, "We would like to thank you for keeping the FPST Community safe throughout your employment with us."

At a directors meeting, Chief Blackeye announced his resignation and welcomed the new designee Interim Chief of Police Juarez. The primary responsibility is to manage the tribal police department during the transition period until a permanent replacement is chosen.

Juarez stated "I am honored to be given the ability to be acting Interim Chief of Police for the Fallon Paiute and Shoshone Tribe until the permanent position is filled. I will continue to serve and protect the Fallon Paiute Shoshone Tribe, tribal members, community members, and the tribal entity. I will remain fair, impartial and humble. I will continue to work closely with the FPST and FBC. I want to ensure you while I am interim Chief of Police I will guarantee that the community member, members of the Fallon Paiute Shoshone Tribe and the Fallon Paiute Shoshone Tribe's interests, as outlined in the Tribal Constitution as well as the Tribal Law and Order Code are protected."

"I am an enrolled member of the Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribe, Granddaughter of Dewey Sampson and Carmelita Sampson, Member of the Klamath Tribes. I have nine years' experience within Law Enforcement. I have assumed a prominent position where I collaborated seamlessly with multidisciplinary teams within different counties and jurisdictions. I have actively participated in the Missing and Murdered Indian People Task Force, the Behavioral Health Task Force, Safe Trails Task Force and I'm currently in the process to be cross deputized with the Federal Bureau of Investigation," stated Juarez.




The Emergency Management Department attended the NV Preparedness Summit

ENVIRONMENTAL DEPARTMENT

Environmental Assistant-This position will provide administrative and program assistance to the Environmental Protection Department. The incumbent will perform specific objectives and work plan activities as directed in compliance with environmental programs administered by the Fallon Tribe.

Salary Range: \$14.42-\$21.81

Environmental Specialist-The Environmental Specialist performs specific objectives and work plan activities under established environmental grants, assists Environmental Director in management duties, planning and administration of environmental protection, and HAZMAT activities. This is a high-demand position on a salary scale; therefore overtime is not available to the position recipient. Duration of this position is based on current and future funding availability.

Salary Range \$18.26-\$21.81

Environmental Specialist I-The Environmental Specialist 1 is an entry level position in the Environmental Specialist series. Under close direction of the Environmental Manager, the environmental Specialist 1 learns and performs variety of routine and specialized tasks associated with environmental protection. The Environmental Specialist 1 will complete objectives under an established environmental program and assist the Environmental Manager in other environmental protection and hazardous materials activities. Duration of position is based on current and future funding availability. Salary Range: \$16.23-\$19.38

LAW ENFORCEMENT

Police Officer Trainee-The Police Officer Trainee is entry level Law Enforcement position. Trainees will participate in initial departmental training and orientation programs, including attending an accredited Police Academy. The Police Officer Trainee is a non-sworn position designed specifically and solely for the purpose of employing Police Officer candidates in trainee status during the initial basic police officer academy training. Incumbents will be afforded the opportunity to be appointed to and sworn in as a probationary entry level police officer with full police authority upon successful and satisfactory completion of academy training.

Salary Range: \$24.55-\$29.31

Police Officer-Performs Law Enforcement/Public Safety duties by maintaining order, responding to emergencies, protecting people and property within the Reservation and Colony; enforcing motor vehicle and criminal laws within Tribal codes and Nevada Revised Statues when appropriate; promoting good community relations. If coming from reciprocity state or approved federal program as an equivalent to a Nevada Category I peace officer there are eligibility requirements that will need to be met. Maintain a working relationship with city, county, state and federal allied agencies. Salary Range: \$24.56-\$29.31

FALLON TRIBAL HEALTH CENTER

Intramural Activities Coordinator-Plans, organizes, and manages culturally appropriate sports and recreational activities for tribal youth, adults, elders, and families to promote healthy living, fitness, and wellness in a manner that ensure the health and safety of participants and the promotion of a drug and alcohol-free lifestyle. Hours are varied and mainly occur afternoons, evenings, weekends, and some holidays. Salary Range: \$19.38-\$23.14

Dementia Care Specialist-This position is responsible for coordinating the Fallon Tribal Health Center ("FTHC") dementia program including coordinating care for dementia patients; addressing mitigating factors leading to dementia; decrease stigma and increase awareness of dementia, and educating patients, family members, caregivers and the community regarding dementia. Salary Range:\$21.81-\$26.04

Medical Assistant (MA)-This position is responsible for providing pharmaceutical care and education to the patients of the Fallon Tribal Health Center and supports all related activities to ensure that high-quality care is provided to all patients.

Salary Range: \$16.23-\$19.38

Certified Pharmacy Technician II-This position involves duties that require specialized skills and an extensive knowledge of pharmaceutical and pharmacy practices. The position requires application of judgment based on substantial experience in pharmaceutical procedures. The Pharmacy Technician is responsible for assisting the pharmacist(s) in ensuring the effective and efficient provision of patient care within the scope of the clinic.

Salary Range: \$16.23 - \$19.38

Pharmacist-The Associate Director – Quality and Compliance is under the general supervision of the Health Director. The incumbent is responsible for assisting in the development, implementation, evaluation and supervision of assigned components of the Health Center's quality improvement programs, clinical case management, regulatory affairs and accreditation. Responsibilities include developing and implementing policies and operationally practices and coordinating and promoting common activities of assigned components to ensure the delivery of quality and fiscally responsible health care. This position is also responsible for developing operational and policy and procedures to integrate services, eliminate duplication and optimize safety. Does related work as required.

Salary Range: \$56.16-67.06

Associate Director- Quality and Compliance- is under the general supervision of the Health Director. The incumbent is responsible for assisting in the development, implementation, evaluation and supervision of assigned components of the Health Center's quality improvement programs, clinical case management, regulatory affairs and accreditation. Responsibilities include developing and implementing policies and operationally practices and coordinating and promoting common activities of assigned components to ensure the delivery of quality and fiscally responsible health care. Dental Hygienist-Perform dental prophylactic treatments and instruct groups and individuals in the care of teeth and mouth. **Salary Range:** \$37.13-44.33

Dental Assistant II (Certified)-The incumbent performs a wide variety of advanced duties to facilitate clinic functions in general dentistry, including chairside assistance in all phases of restorative, prosthodontics, surgical endodontic and periodontics treatment; performs prophylaxis and range of reversible introoral procedures under the direction of the dentist; and provides assistance in clinic management,

Physician-Family Practice-This position provides direct and comprehensive primary, preventative and therapeutic medical and nursing care to individuals across the lifespan at the Fallon Tribal Health Center. Salary Range:\$114.16-\$136.31

Prevention Specialist-The Native Connections Prevention Specialist is responsible for the planning and implementation of prevention programs and initiatives directed to address suicide, prevent substance misuse and promote mental health. Prevention Specialist will work with youth and family serving tribal programs, agencies and schools to promote positive lifestyles, reduce suicide attempts and completions, and eliminate drug use and other risk factors that lead to unhealthy behaviors.

Salary Range: \$19.38-\$23.14

COMMUNITY LEARNING CENTER

Community Learning Center Specialist-The CLC Specialists provide services on behalf of the Tribe, to address the educational, personal, social, cultural, and emotional needs of tribal and community members attending educational institutions and pursuing various academic opportunities so that they may reach their maximum potential and develop a positive academic, social, and cultural experience. These positions are responsible for establishing effective collaboration, coordination, and communication between participants, families, the community, and the Community Learning Center Salary Range: \$12.81-\$20.56

ADMINISTRATION

Tribal Administrator-The Tribal Administrator is responsible for the daily operations of assigned Tribal departments and programs, including all contracts and grants services, as directed by the authority of the Fallon Business Council. The Tribal Administrator works under direction of the Fallon Business Council (FBC) to carry out the goals and objectives of the Fallon Paiute-Shoshone Tribe. The Tribal Administrator performs his/her duties and responsibilities in recognition that the FBC is the final authority for the Tribe and works within their direction and guidance, as well as in compliance with Tribal laws and Tribal policies. He/she has the overall responsibility of overseeing all Tribal departments and programs. Salary Range: \$41.79-49.90

Administrative Receptionist-Serve as key personnel to the department: receive, direct, and screen visitors, handle telephone calls and provide assistance or technical information concerning policies, procedures and other details.

Salary Range: \$14.42-\$17.22

HUMAN RESOURCE DEPARTMENT

Human Resources Director-The Human Resources Director will be responsible for the overall personnel management, which includes recruitment, employee relations, employee benefits program, salary administration, workers compensation, grievance and appeal system, and personnel records management

SENIOR CENTER

Senior Center Manager-This position supervises and participates in the operation of the Tribe's Senior Center; conducts and coordinates education, health, recreational and social services for participants; and provides a nutritional program in accordance with applicable tribal, federal, state and local laws, rules and regulations. Salary Range:\$26.04-\$31.09

Kitchen Assistant-As the Kitchen Assistant, the incumbent will be responsible to assist the Senior Center staff with daily preparation of regular meals, keeping the kitchen orderly, sanitized and all equipment ready for use. The incumbent will also, as part of their daily duties, keep restrooms, annex, and building clean and orderly. Salary Range\$14.42-\$17.22

Kitchen Technician-As the Kitchen Technician, the incumbent will be responsible to assist the kitchen staff with daily preparation of regular meals, keeping the kitchen orderly, sanitized and all equipment ready for use. 




